For February 9, 2023

- Secret Pal Valentine lunch lists and bags are coming home today. Be sure you have some choices from the list for next Tuesday, and your child should spend some time decorating the lunch bag the bag. It is more fun if students DO NOT share who they have as a secret pal. If you have any questions, your child should be able to answer them or send me an email and I will clarify.
- We had wonderful Book Talks this week. Again, much interest was generated for the stories that others are reading. The children gathered clever items that related well to their story. The next report is a written one completed in class on March 16th. This one will be a Think Tac Toe. The format will be a Think Tac Toe much the same as Tic Tac Toe. Students will pick the boxes across, down, or diagonally then answer the questions in each box. An example would be, compare two of the characters in your story.
- We have almost competed our chapter book, Shiloh and will begin Castle in the Attic. This story is about a boy, William, who gets a real-looking stone and wood model of a castle with a drawbridge, moat, and finger-high knight to guard the gates. As William picks up the knight, he comes alive and they are both off on a quest to fight a fiery dragon and an evil wizard so Sir Simon, the knight, can win back his kingdom.
- ♣ Many of the Fourth Graders met or exceeded their goals for Winter MAP testing. Please keep in mind that this is one test area on a single day, midyear, and in no way reflects what they have shown me, or can do, in my class. Remember, the MAP test is a computer-adaptive test. It is uniquely created for each student based on how he or she responds to question. If a student responds correctly the next question will be a little harder, or, a little easier if the student responded incorrectly.

All MAP test questions come from a huge bank of questions with each corresponding in difficulty to a particular RIT score. Because a question with a RIT level of 215 is more difficult or represents a higher level of learning or skill level, than a question from a RIT level of 214, it is possible to measure growth over time. Educators expect RIT scores to

increase over time. Students at lower grade levels tend to show a greater increase in RIT scores during a school year than students in higher grade levels. At higher levels, questions get harder, and the overall growth is a smaller proportion of all that one knows. Anticipated growth rates for each student are based on national norms and should be viewed as "typical," not expected. If you have any questions email me and I will try to answer them.
